In Memoriam -- Harry J. Walsh, Jr.

Harry J. Walsh, Jr., Life Master, bridge teacher and club director, died November 19, 2006, at home in Meridian MS. He was formerly of Fort Collins. Harry was 83.

Harry was a gentle, soft-spoken man who was always willing to advise or teach novice and intermediate bridge players. He had a handout for all the bridge topics anyone wanted to know about. He set up and ran duplicate games at people's houses. He loved to see people play bridge, learn, and have fun. He ran the Friday afternoon club at the Senior Center for several years. He regularly brought his wife, Jean, with him to play with whoever needed a partner.

Harry was born in Buffalo, N.Y. on March 26, 1925. He was a U.S. Army veteran. He received a B.A. degree from San Jose University. He worked for the Library of Congress in Washington, D.C., then later as owner of an electronics company. He and Jean moved to Fort Collins to retire.

He was a member of the Elks and Kiwanis clubs. He enjoyed bridge, sports, bowling and especially golf.

His wife, Jean, their two daughters and husbands, and several grand children, survive Harry.

IMPROVE YOUR PLAY

Here is a look at defensive carding principles. Most people use attitude as the primary signal when following to partner's lead. With this understanding, a high card asks for a continuation and a low card suggests a switch or indicates no strength in the suit. See how you would have done with this hand.

BIDDING: After East overcalled 1♥, South showed 5+ spades with his 1♠ bid. With only a four-card suit, South would have made a negative double. North had an easy raise and South went on to game.

PLAY: In response to his partner's overcall, West led the queen of hearts. Hoping for a continuation, declarer played low from dummy. East immediately saw the danger in dummy's long club suit and signaled with the heart deuce that he did not want the suit continued. West made the obvious switch to diamonds and the contract was defeated. It is easy to see that if West had continued with a second heart, declarer would win any continuation, draw trumps, and discard his remaining red cards on the club suit. In fact, East would have to cash the diamond ace at trick three just to prevent the overtrick.

There was nothing difficult about this hand. Just remember that every card you play sends a message. Don't be mechanical, watch the cards.



IMPROVE YOUR PLAY

Bridge is such a great game because each hand presents a different challenge. The following hand is not that difficult but several declarers failed. Take the South seat and see how you would have done.

BIDDING: North's raise to 3♠ propelled you into a thin game but with your skill as a declarer, it shouldn't be a problem.

PLAY: West led a top heart and switched to trumps. Since they will return another trump when they regain the lead, you will not be able to ruff a heart in dummy. Assuming trumps divide 3-2, how do you play to avoid losing three hearts along with a spade?

SOLUTION: Since you can't ruff your losing heart, you could draw two rounds of trump and then play on diamonds. This works if the player who holds the third spade has to follow to three rounds of diamonds. However, there is a better line: Simply follow to the second trick with a low spade from each hand. As long as the trumps are 3-2 and the diamonds behave, there is nothing the opponents can do.

Well, did you impress your partner and opponents?

THE DRURY CONVENTION

The Drury Convention is an artificial 2♣ response that's used by a passed hand after partner opens 1♥ or 1♠ in third or fourth seat. It shows 3+ card trump support and maximum playing values (10+ support points). Drury is a very valuable convention that comes up frequently, is easy to remember, and can dramatically improve your bidding accuracy. Here's the type of problem it solves:

♠J43 ♥A75 ♦KQ532 ♣64 -- You pass and partner opens 1♠ in third seat. Without Drury, you have a choice of four possibly disastrous responses:

- 1 - You make a limit-raise to 3♠ and go down because partner opened light.
- 2 - You raise conservatively to 2♠, partner passes, and you make 10 tricks because he had a full opener.
- 3 - You bid 1NT (forcing or standard), partner passes, and you get a poor score because the rest of the field is playing in their 8-card spade fit.
- 4 - You try a "temporizing" 2♦, partner passes and you get an even worse score.

A Drury 2♣ response shows your support and strength right away, allowing you to bid your hand's full value without getting too high. It gives you a built-in safety valve if partner has opened light and it helps opener evaluate chances for game.

Drury is used only when you're a passed hand and partner has opened 1♥ or 1♠ in third or fourth seat. If you have 6-9 points, you make your normal raise to 2 of the major. If you're stronger, you use the Drury 2♣ response, which always shows:

- 1 - At least 3-card support for partner's major.
- 2 - A maximum passed hand (10+ support points.).

Evaluating your hand

A Drury 2♣ response is encouraging, but it doesn't promise a strong game invitation. To use Drury, you should have something better than just a maximum high-card-point single raise, and you'll often have to come up with a descriptive rebid to pinpoint your strength. Here are some examples of responding hands after partner opens 1♥:

♠AK43 ♥1097 ♦5 ♣J10864 -- Bid 2♣. This is only 8 high-card points, but it evaluates to 10 support points.

♠963 ♥Q102 ♦KJ84 ♣KJ4 -- Bid 2♣. This is a dead-minimum Drury bid, and you'll show it by making a minimum rebid in hearts at your next turn (or by passing if partner rebids 2♥).

♠3 ♥Q874 ♦AJ954 ♣K43 -- Bid 2♣. This is a fairly strong Drury hand, and you plan to bid 4♥ if partner's rebid shows he has a full opener. But don't hang him for opening light -- if partner rebids 2♥ to show a sub-minimum, you should pass. Your hand may be stronger than partner's!

♠KJ3 ♥842 ♦Q754 ♣QJ4 -- Bid 2♥. This is a flat 9 points with poor trumps, so just make a simple raise.

Opener's Rebids

Opener's rebid over 2♣ shows whether or not he has a "full" opening bid. A popular treatment called "Reverse Drury" uses the rebid of his suit to show the bad hand. Most other bids are natural and show at least a full opener. Although some partnerships use different methods, here is a popular set of responses:

- **2 of your major** (1♠-2♣-2♠) = bare minimum or sub-opener. The Drury bidder can now pass safely at the 2-level.
- **2♦** = a "normal" opening bid, but with nothing extra (13 points.) -- usually a hand that would have passed a standard limit raise. The Drury bidder can sign off at 2 with a minimum or jump to 3 (or 4) with a real powerhouse.
- **2♥** (after 1♠-2♣) = Full opener with 4 hearts. This allows you to find a 4-4 fit, which will often play better than a 5-3.
- **Any other new suit** (1♥-2♣-2♠, or 1♠-2♣-3♣) = Extra values, showing a second suit and at least game-try values.
- **3 of your major** (1♠-2♣-3♠) = invitational to game. The Drury bidder can pass with bare-minimum values for his call.
- **Double jump in a new suit** (1♠-2♣-4♣, 4♦, or 4♥) = Splinter, showing a slam try with singleton in that suit.
- **2NT** = A strong notrump opener (15-17). If the Drury bidder is also balanced, 3NT may be a better spot.
- **3NT** = Balanced, 18+ points.
- **4 of your major** = any hand that wants to play game opposite 10 support points. Opener will usually choose this bid unless he wants to try for a slam.

Choosing your rebid

You open 1♠ in third seat and partner bids 2♣ (Drury). What is your rebid?

♠AQJ54 ♥1032 ♦J2 ♣K64 -- Bid 2♠ to show a sub-minimum. Partner will almost always pass.

♠KQJ73 ♥4 ♦102 ♣AQ1065 -- Bid 4♠. There's no point in bidding 3♣, which will only serve to give the opponents information.

♠KJ9543 ♥32 ♦AK3 ♣Q5 -- Bid 3♠ to invite game. If partner has more than a minimum Drury response, he'll bid 4♠.

♠KQ653 ♥AQ ♦QJ2 ♣A103 -- Bid 3NT to offer a choice of games. Partner can pass with balanced strength or go back to 4♠ if he has a ruffing value.

♠A9875 ♥KQ103 ♦A10 ♣74 -- Bid 2♥. This shows a full opener and a 4-card heart suit, but it doesn't necessarily promise extra strength. If partner raises to 3♥, you'll bid 4♥. If he retreats to 2♠, he has a minimum (and probably wasn't encouraged by your heart bid), and you can pass.

♠K8543 ♥A62 ♦AQ3 ♣54 -- Bid 2♦. This tells partner you have a full opener, but that you aren't strong enough to accept a normal game invitation. If partner has maximum playing strength, this provides some encouragement. If he has a balanced minimum, he can retreat to 2♠ and you can pass.

Alert Procedures

(The 5th and final installment of a series on the subject of Alerts)

PART V (cont): HIGH-LEVEL OPENING BIDS AND RAISES:

Natural and preemptive (weak) opening suit bids at the three-level are not Alertable. If you commonly preempt at this level with very weak suits (worse than Qxxxx) or suits of fewer than six cards you must pre-Alert your methods. Intermediate, strong, or conventional uses must be Alerted.

3NT: A 3NT opening that promises a strong, balanced hand is not Alertable. Gambling 3NT openings and all other conventional uses must be Alerted.

Natural opening bids at the three-level or higher, which convey an unusual message regarding HCP range, or any other information, which might be unexpected to the opponents, must be Alerted.

EXAMPLE: .4H openings that are natural but are weaker than might be expected because the partnership has some other method (an example is the Namyats convention) for showing a good 4H, 4S opening.

EXAMPLE: 1H-P-4H when playing a forcing club where the 4H call may have, by agreement, values for game but not slam.

EXAMPLE: A natural 3C opening that is stronger than expected since the partnership has agreed to open 2S (a Mid-Chart agreement so the Mid-Chart has to be in effect) with weak minor-suit preempts.

REMEMBER: Below game, non-forcing natural suit responses to preemptive openings require an Alert.

PART VI: OTHER CONSTRUCTIVE CALLS – Natural jump raises in competition are not Alertable regardless of strength. In the same vein, natural jump shifts in competition do not require an Alert, regardless of strength.

PART VII: DEFENSIVE AND COMPETITIVE CALLS

A jump to 2NT to show the minors or the lower unbid suits is not Alertable. A bid of 3NT as unusual must be Alerted. A bid of 4NT is not Alertable as long as the prior bid was by an opponent. Non-jump unusual notrump bids below 4NT, except those made by a passed hand, must be Alerted.

Natural jump overcalls that are weak do not require an Alert. All other natural and conventional meanings are Alertable. Unusual overcalls, including the tendency to overcall at the two-level frequently with a suit of fewer than five cards or with less than two-over-one values (approximately 10 HCP), must be Alerted.

PART VII: DELAYED (or POST) ALERTS (ALERTABLE CALLS ABOVE THE LEVEL OF 3NT, STARTING WITH OPENER'S SECOND TURN TO CALL)

Once the auction has progressed to the point that the opening bidder has had the opportunity to make a second call, conventional calls at the four-level or higher are not Alerted until the auction is over.

These DELAYED ALERTS are REQUIRED to be made by the DECLARING side before the opening lead. The DEFENDERS are REQUIRED to Alert declarer AFTER the OPENING LEAD, but BEFORE declarer makes a play from dummy (Alerting before the opening lead is turned face-up and the dummy is spread is best).

The declaring side must make its Delayed Alerts before the opening lead. Defenders wait until they have made the opening lead before they explain calls requiring a Delayed Alert. As with normal Alerts, the partner of the person making the Alertable call is the person who makes the Delayed Alert and explains the agreement.

EXAMPLES:

1H-P-1S-P-4D (splinter)

There is no Alert at the time of the 4D bid. After the auction, the 1S bidder must Alert and explain the meaning of the call.

1C-P-1H-P-2H-P: 4C,4D, or 4S

If there was a conventional meaning attached to any of these calls – ace-asking, splinter, or something else- the Alert takes place after the auction.

UNUSUAL CARDING AGREEMENTS

Except for leading low from a doubleton that requires a pre-Alert, carding agreements do not require an Alert of any kind. However, the box on the card in the middle of SPECIAL CARDING [] PLEASE ASK must be checked when playing a completely unexpected method or one that is not easily or clearly described by simply checking a box.

EXAMPLES:

Leading low from a doubleton (also requires an Alert)

Carding that changes during the hand

Obvious switch agreements

DECLARER IS EXPECTED TO EXAMINE AN OPPONENT’S CONVENTION CARD, WITHOUT PROMPTING, IN ORDER TO ASCERTAIN THEIR DEFENSIVE METHODS.
