Education: MENTOR MAGIC

The Northern Colorado Bridge Unit 363 is a Community of Learners

Our Unit is very fortunate to have an active mentor program. For the past year, non-life masters have paired up with more experienced players and benefited from their knowledge. These games take place at the club games on the 5th Monday and the 5th Wednesday of each month. A positive outcome of this program has been increased participation by the newer players in club and Unit games in addition to the 199er Thursday Night Fort Fun game.

It has been wonderful to see these pairings continue outside the “official” mentor games. At almost every club and Unit game there are pairings of newer and more experienced players. We have created an atmosphere where learning is supported and nurtured. Our newer players feel comfortable playing with the “better” players and these “better” players are encouraging the newer player to grow. And everyone benefits when the Unit itself becomes more competitive. The Unit’s win in the first-ever Boulder/Fort Collins Challenge Match may be a direct result of this program.

ACBL has encouraged units to sustain mentor activities and has published on their website guidelines for an effective mentor program. Each mentor and mentee should reflect upon these guidelines and assess whether they are taking full advantage of this opportunity. The following are some guidelines that each pair might consider:

Responsibilities of a Mentee:

1. Respect your mentor’s time. Your mentor should allow sufficient time before the game to fill out a convention card. After the game your mentor should discuss difficult hands and other problems that came up during the month. Play with your mentor more than just at the official games, if possible.
2. Take action on the information provided by your mentor. Do not be overly sensitive to constructive criticism. Study on your own.
3. Show respect for your mentor’s efforts. Your behavior and follow-through are how you express respect and appreciation for your mentor.
4. Pass on the gift of mentoring by taking on a newcomer of your own whenever possible.

Responsibilities of a Mentor:

1. Give of your time unselfishly. Allow sufficient time to fill out the convention card together before the game and to review difficult hands afterward. Start with simple agreements and proceed toward more complex systems as your partnership grows. Analyzing difficult hands with your mentee is an essential learning tool.
2. Be willing to share your expertise and knowledge. Always remember that what seems obvious to you can be totally opaque and foreign to the newer player.

3. Make a commitment to play regularly with your mentee in “official” mentor games and any other games that fit your schedules. By playing with the same mentee over a period of time, you can really further their growth and learning.

DID YOU KNOW?

Did you know there is a section on Conduct and Etiquette that is part of the Laws of Duplicate Bridge? This section states, in part:

As a matter of courtesy, a player should refrain from:

- Paying insufficient attention to the game.
- Making gratuitous comments during the auction and play.
- Detaching a card before it is his turn to play.
- Prolonging play unnecessarily (as in playing on although he knows all of the tricks are surely his) for the purpose of disconcerting an opponent.
- Summoning or addressing the Director in a manner discourteous to him or other contestants.

The Director is authorized to award an adjusted score when the Laws do not provide an indemnity to the non-offending side for the particular violation of Law committed by the opponents.

IMPROVE YOUR PLAY

It's so important to listen to the bidding. While this may seem simple and obvious, it is surprising so many people listen but do not hear. Take a look, or rather, a listen.

BIDDING: North had a very good takeout double and East redoubled to promise 10 or more HCP. South properly took a preference to spades and West's 2♦ bid showed a red two-suiter with no extras and no particular desire to defend. North wasn't done and competed to 2♠. East was tempted to double but waited on West's next call. After West bid 3♦, North loved his hand and bid one more. East knew what to do and 3♠ doubled became the final contract.

PLAY: It's too gory to describe the details but declarer ended up with only five tricks for down four and a score of -1100. North was heard to say "But, I had 17 HCP, I had to bid again". Let's do the math that North should have done at the table: (approx. numbers) West: 13 HCP, North: 17 HCP, East: 10 HCP, South: well, that doesn't leave South with any, does it? North must know as soon as the redouble is made that his partner is broke. This is a terrible case of a player bidding his hand without LISTENING to his partner.

Note that East could (and perhaps should) have doubled 2♠ but he had faith that his partner would take another call and it looked like North wasn't through bidding. Auctions with the redouble should be discussed thoroughly with your partners.



RESPONDING TO PARTNER'S OVERCALL

There are many textbooks with instructions for opening bids and responses to opening bids. There is also a lot of information covering interventions (takeout doubles, overcalls, etc), but one area that is unclear to many players is how to respond to partner's overcall.

First, let's "name" the people at the table so we can better define their role. Of course we have **opener** and **responder** but we also have **intervener** (one who makes the overcall or t/o double) and his partner, the **advancer**. Take note that the intervener may be in second seat or fourth seat.

Now, let me state an important point: **Since partner made an overcall instead of an opening bid, he might have a *fairly light hand* and our responses must accommodate that possibility.** Our actions include a simple raise, a preemptive jump raise, forward-going NT bids, a cue bid of opener's suit to ask partner about his strength, or a new suit. The cue bid will usually promise support, but before we can agree on that, we must decide what a new suit by advancer is telling partner.

Look at the **SIMPLE OVERCALL** section on the convention card. Below the high card point (hcp) range is the **RESPONSES** section. This menu offers three ways to play a new suit by advancer: **1) Forcing, 2) Non-Forcing Constructive, and 3) Non-Forcing.** Our first decision is to choose from these options so let's examine each of them.

FORCING: Well, the name tells it all but does it really make sense to wait until we have a big hand before we can share information with partner? Let's do the math: Give opener a minimum (around 14 hcp) and overcaller a minimum (around 12 hcp) and that leaves 14 hcp for you and responder to share. If either opener or overcaller has extras, you will have even less. Your average point count as advancer is probably in the 4-10 range. Sure, you will sometimes hold a big hand, but it will not happen often so I do not recommend this option.

NON-FORCING CONSTRUCTIVE: This approach is the middle road. It shows some values but partner may pass if his overcall was light or he doesn't fit your suit. But, since you do show some strength, he can raise and game or a good partscore may be reached. I recommend this option.

NON-FORCING: This is merely an attempt to improve the contract and promises no more than a suit preferred over their partner's. It may be very weak.

Now let's look at other actions available to advancer.

SIMPLE RAISE: This is the same 6-9 point range you use over partner's opening bid.

JUMP RAISE: It is best to use this as a preemptive bid, applying as much pressure as soon as you can. With a good raise, you will cue bid.

CUE BID: A bid of the opponent's suit has more than one meaning. The most common shows a limit (10-12) or better raise of your partner's suit and asks how good his overcall is. Partner will rebid his suit with a minimum and take other action with extras. Another use of the cue bid is to show a good hand and your own suit. This is necessary if a new suit bid by you is non-forcing. After advanced cue bids, the auction is forcing until a previously bid suit has been rebid or raised, or game has been reached.

JUMP SHIFT: A jump in a new suit is highly invitational. Holding ♠Q2 ♥108 ♦Q9 ♣AQ10987 with this auction:

OPP	PARD	OPP	YOU
1♥	1♠	P	??

The reasoning is since 2♣ is not forcing, then 3♣ should show a good hand. If you first cue bid 2♥, the bidding may get too high before you are able to show your club suit. If partner has a weak overcall and no real fit for clubs, he is allowed to pass your jump to 3♣. **Remember, either a simple new suit or a jump by advancer almost always denies support for your overcall suit.**

As always, there are other accepted methods, so you need to discuss these with your partners. Here is a chart I recommend:

			3♦ = good suit, good hand, highly invitational
			3♥ = good suit, good hand, highly invitational
			3♠ = preemptive
			3NT = to play; 14+ hcp with clubs stopped
			4♠ = Preemptive? To make? Make the opponents guess.
