# DID YOU KNOW

Here is what the ACBL has to say about seeding Club Sanctioned Bridge Games. Taken directly (word for word with emphasis added) from ACBL Handbook of Rules and Regulations (2009 Revision. Chapter 4 The Club Sanctioned Bridge Game (pages 23-24):

## "B. SEEDING

Seeding means specifically seating strong pairs (or weak pairs) in a manner relative to the movement, so that every contestant plays against a group of opponents of APPROXIMATELY THE SAME STRENGTH. In a one-section event, both directions should be balanced. In a multi-section event, all fields should be balanced. In two-session events, the balance should be maintained for both sessions.

If there is an ACTIVE EFFORT to seat all strong pairs in one direction and the weak pairs in the other, the session must be classified as an invitational/restricted game. Further, if all strong pairs are seated in one section and all weak pairs in another, the strong section qualifies as open, and the other section becomes restricted/invitational.

SEEDING IS NOT MANDATORY FOR ANY REGULAR MASTERPOINT GAMES. All seating may be random by luck of the draw or on a first-come, first-served basis."

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Commentary by Dawn Foltz:

To me, APPROXIMATELY THE SAME STRENGTH means just what it sounds like. For example, Andrea French and I as a pair are clearly not "approximately the same strength" as Jon Gustafson and Larry Matheny as a pair; while both pairs would be designated as "A" with a 1500 point limit. Just the masterpoint designation is insufficient for determining the approximate strength of a pair, and therefore should only be a part of the consideration when seeding a field.

Additionally, as the final paragraph states: SEEDING IS NOT MANDATORY FOR ANY REGULAR MASTERPOINT GAMES. While several of the clubs in the Northern Colorado Unit strive to set up the "best contest" possible for their games, this is not an ACBL requirement and should only be done as it is conducive to running the game in a timely manner while accommodating the needs of the players.

The goal of seeding is to provide fair, balanced contests. With Mitchell movements an easy way to balance the field is to have pairs from the same stratum (A, B or C) start against each other. This balances the field with roughly equal numbers of players in each stratum in both directions. The biggest matchpoint swings occur when two pairs meet head-to-head at the same table. When the strongest pairs sitting in the opposite directions do not meet each other, the rest of the field is at a big disadvantage. This problem is avoided when they start at the same table and the movement causes them to meet all the other seeded pairs. At tournaments seeded tables in 13+ table games are #3 (top seed), #5 (5<sup>th</sup> seed), #7 (4<sup>th</sup> seed), #9 (2<sup>nd</sup> seed) and #13 (3<sup>rd</sup> seed). Club games should only require 1 or 2 seeded pairs each direction. In a Howell movement no more than one seeded pair should sit in a stationary position and, for example, with 3 stationary pairs a player from each stratum should occupy these positions.

# USEFUL CONVENTIONS

## Lebensohl over Weak-2 Bids

Here is a common auction that can cause problems:

<u>LHO</u>	<u>Partner</u>	<u>RHO</u>	<u>YOU</u>
2♠	DBL	P	3♣

Your partner often has a difficult decision if he has extra values. Since there is such a wide point range for your minimum response (0 to about 9 pts.), he doesn't know if it's safe to bid on. The lebensohl convention was created to help you give partner a more accurate description of your strength in these situations.

Simply stated, after an opponent opens a weak-two bid and your partner makes a takeout double, your bid of 2NT is lebensohl. It says nothing about notrump. It asks partner to bid 3♣, and you can then pass, sign off in a suit, or make another descriptive bid. Now let's take a more detailed look at the convention.

### Weak hands (0-6 pts.)

The lebensohl 2NT is most useful when you have a very weak hand and want to sign off in a suit that is **lower in rank** than the preemptor's suit. If your suit is **higher** in rank than the preemptor's suit (i.e., LHO opens 2♥ and you have spades), you make your normal minimum bid at the 2-level. But if you would have to go to the 3-level to make a minimum bid in your suit, you start with 2NT to relay partner to 3♣. You can now pass if clubs is your suit, or bid another suit. The auction will go:

<u>LHO</u>	<u>Partner</u>	<u>RHO</u>	<u>You</u>
2♠	DBL	P	2NT
P	3♣	P	P (or 3♦ or 3♥)

The doubler will accept your relay with any hand of up to about 18 playing points, but he can refuse it if he has a very powerful hand. With a hand that will make game opposite an average of about 4-5 points in your hand, he should refuse the relay and make another descriptive bid.

### Medium-strength hands (7-10 pts.)

If you bid a suit at the 3-level (instead of using the 2NT sequence), it is encouraging, but not forcing. It shows a hand with constructive values (a good 7 to about 10 pts.), but not enough to jump to game. Doubler can pass with a minimum or bid on with extra values. You can also use the lebensohl 2NT to invite when your suit is higher in rank than the preemptor's suit. If LHO opens 2♥ and you have spades, you can sign off in 2♠ if you're weak.

If you instead use the lebensohl 2NT sequence, it shows invitational values (8-10 pts.). This full auction would be:

<u>LHO</u>	<u>Partner</u>	<u>RHO</u>	<u>You</u>
2♥	DBL	P	2NT
P	3♣	P	3♠

If LHO opened 2♦, you can use the sequence to invite in hearts or spades.

### Forcing hands (11+ pts.)

The lebensohl 2NT sequences above all show limited values. If you have invitational or forcing-to-game strength, your jump responses can all retain their standard meaning.

Here are some examples of lebensohl:

<u>LHO</u>	<u>Partner</u>	<u>RHO</u>	<u>You</u>
2♥	DBL	Pass	?

♠43 ♥7542 ♦J1053 ♣K84 Bid 2NT (lebensohl). Over 3♣, you'll bid 3♦ to show the very weak sign-off hand.

♠J5 ♥Q654 ♦Q64 ♣Q753 With lebensohl, you can't make a natural 2NT bid. This is a very poor 7 pts. so evaluate it down and use the Lebensohl 2NT. You'll pass partner's 3♣.

♠K52 ♥732 ♦AJ643 ♣75 Bid 3♦ to show constructive values. If partner has extra values, he'll bid on.

♠AQ83 ♥742 ♦K873 ♣J9 Bid 2NT (lebensohl). You plan to invite by bidding 3♠ over partner's 3♣.

♠AQ1084 ♥4 ♦A1097 ♣1073 Bid 4♠. This hand is too good for a lebensohl sequence, which partner can pass.

### Specialized uses of lebensohl

Lebensohl can be a beneficial addition to your system if you limit it to just the standard treatments above. If you want to adopt some more advanced uses of the convention, you can add special sequences to distinguish between different types of forcing and invitational hands. We don't have the space here, so you will have to do the homework.




# IMPROVE YOUR PLAY

Proper hand evaluation is often difficult. The auction will usually be your best gauge to understand the importance of your honor cards and your distribution. This hand offers a good example.

**BIDDING:** There are many conventions to use over the opponents' opening 1NT. This North-South partnership uses a double to show either the majors or the minors. After East redoubled to suggest his side had the balance of power, South ran to 2♣ hoping North held the minor suits. But, North followed with 2♥ showing the majors so South took a preference to 2♠. He was expecting the opponents to double but instead heard his partner raise. South looked at this weak hand and stopped to reflect on the auction. After hearing the 1NT opening and East showing strength, North still was inviting game. South knew that his partner must hold a really strong major two-suiter and realized the importance of the king-queen of hearts. He accepted the invitation but was both eager and nervous to see the dummy.

**PLAY:** West won the two minor suit aces and continued with another diamond. South ruffed this in dummy and played a heart to his hand. He then led a spade to dummy's king followed by another heart to his hand. A second spade toward dummy was won by West. He forced dummy to ruff another minor suit card after which South drew the last trump and made his contract.

This hand was well bid by North. He knew the dangers in missing a vulnerable game at this form of scoring. At the other table, North-South stopped in 3♠ making four and South was heard to say: "But, I only had five points".

This was an exciting hand. Note it takes a heart opening lead to defeat 3NT by East-West.
