Player's Notes

4NT: NATURAL OR BLACKWOOD?

One of the most frequently used (and mis-used) conventions is Blackwood. It has been around for a long time but there is still confusion whether some 4NT bids ask for aces or are quantitative raises of no-trump. Let's look at a few basic bidding sequences:

1NT	4NT	2NT	4NT	1♦	1♠
				2NT	4NT

Most people agree these are no-trump raises asking opener to pass with a minimum hand but bid 6NT if he has a maximum. However, since there are hands where discovering the number of aces after a 1NT opener is important, Gerber was created to fill that need. Here are some basic Gerber auctions:

1NT	4♣	2NT	4♣	1♦	1♠
				2NT	4♣

Gerber is generally used when the only question is the number of aces. A typical hand for responder to bid 4♣ after 1NT might be: ♠AKQ10 ♥KQJ10876 ♦3 ♣5.

These are all straight forward and seldom cause problems for most partnerships. Confusion rears its ugly head when the auctions are more complex. How does your partnership handle the following?

1NT	2♣	1NT	2♦*
2♥	4NT	2♥	4NT

*transfer

Is 4NT quantitative or Blackwood? If you think it is ace asking, what do you do after 1NT by your partner and you hold: ♠KJ98 ♥K65 ♦32 ♣AKQ5? You could bypass Stayman and invite slam by bidding 4NT with your first bid, but you risk missing a good spade contract and finding partner without diamond values. In the second sequence, what do you bid after transferring to hearts with this hand: ♠K4 ♥KQ1098 ♦AK7 ♣J73?

While there are different ways to handle these bidding questions, there is a simple solution. After a Stayman response or a transfer, use the bid of 4NT as quantitative and a jump to 4♣ to ask for aces. Some examples:

1NT	4NT (quantitative)	1NT	4♣ (Gerber)	1NT	2♣
				2♠	4NT (quantitative with four hearts)

1NT	2♣	1NT	2♥*	1NT	2♥*
2♠	4♣ (ace asking)	2♠	4NT (quantitative)	2♠	4♣ (ace asking with 6+ spades)

*transfer

Now that you have digested this, here are some ideas for partnerships ready to use additional conventions.

AUTO-SPLINTERS

Use a double jump after a transfer to show shortness. Some examples are:

1NT	2♥*	1NT	2♦*
2♠	4♦	2♥	3♠ (a single jump but still a splinter)

*transfer

These sequences show a 6+ major with a singleton or void in the jump suit. This helps opener re-evaluate his hand. As already indicated, a jump to 4♣ would be ace asking.

TEXAS TRANSFERS

These are transfers into hearts or spades at the four-level and show 6+ card suits. If you use Texas Transfers along with Jacoby Transfers, you do not have to give up the 4♣ auto-splinter bid mentioned above. When holding a 6+ card major, transfer at the four-level and then bid 4NT to ask for aces. Here are some examples using **both** transfers:

1NT	4♥*	1NT	4♥*
4♣	P (sign-off)	4♣	4NT (Blackwood)
1NT	2♥*	1NT	2♥*
2♣	4♣ (auto-splinter)	2♣	4♣ (mild slam try)

*transfer

Please understand there are other solutions to these bidding challenges and each partnership should discuss them in detail. My intent is not to encourage you to add conventions, but rather to review some of the bidding sequences that are frequently a source of confusion. Also, bidding in contract bridge is changing faster than at any time in the past and you need to be aware of some of the tools being used against you. The theme of this article is 4NT, but I will close with a list of other ace-asking conventions currently being used that may or may not use 4NT.

Roman Keycard Blackwood – Includes the king of the agreed suit when showing aces.

Four of an agreed minor – This is used to keep the level low.

Kickback – A bid directly above the agreed suit is used to ask for aces/keycards.

Exclusion Blackwood – This is a jump to the five-level (in a void) asking for aces/keycards outside the void suit.

Player's Notes

IMPROVE YOUR PLAY with Larry Matheny

Here is another look at how Blackwood is misused. It should be only be employed when you KNOW you want to be in slam but want to make sure you are not missing two aces, OR two cashing tricks. If the response to 4NT doesn't answer your question, then you probably should not have used it. See how you would have done with this hand.

BIDDING: North's bid of 3♠ was a limit raise showing four-card support and 10-12 high card points. South held a monster hand and knew he was in slam range. In the first auction, South asked for aces and after discovering his partner had one, bid the slam. In the second auction, South realized that he could lose two diamonds as well as a heart. He cue bid 4C and after his partner cue bid the ace of hearts, South jumped to 5♣. This asked North for either first or second round control of diamonds, the unbid suit. (On the previous round of bidding, North denied the diamond ace when he skipped over the suit to bid 4♥, but he could hold the king or a singleton.) North had an easy pass.

PLAY: West quickly cashed the top two diamonds leaving the second South relieved and the first one with an irate partner. Holding a small doubleton in an unbid suit is a danger sign, so remember: If the question is WHICH aces rather than HOW MANY aces, Blackwood may not help.

Please note that even if you use the Roman Keycard Blackwood convention (4 aces + trump king), a response of 5♥ showing two keycards would not help. The opponents still have two cashing tricks.

Alert Procedures

(The 4th of a series on the subject of Alerts)

PART V (cont): NOTRUMP OPENINGS, RESPONSES AND REBIDS

RESPONSES TO ONE NO TRUMP OPENINGS

2C: If it requires partner to bid a four-card major it is not Alertable; all of other uses must be Alerted.

2D, 2H, or 2S: If natural and non-invitational, they are not Alertable. A two-level transfer is Announced. All other uses must be Alerted, including a 2S transfer to 3C.

2NT: If invitational to 3NT, it is not Alertable. All other uses must be Alerted.

3C, 3D, 3H, 3S: If natural, they are not Alertable. All other uses must be Alerted, or...

3D, 3H, 4D, 4H: If transfers to hearts and spades, respectively, must be Announced.

PART VI: OPENING SUIT BIDS, RESPONSES, AND REBIDS

1C: Not Alertable if natural (three or more cards in minor) and non-forcing. Announceable if fewer than three cards is the only unusual meaning, (e.g. "Could be fewer than three"). Any other meaning must be Alerted (e.g. Precision opening 1C).

1D: Not Alertable if natural (three or more cards in minor) and non-forcing. Announceable if fewer than three cards is the only unusual meaning. Any other meaning must be Alerted.

1H, 1S: Not Alertable if natural (four or more cards in major) and non-forcing. (Note that canapé systems must be pre-Alerted and canapé bids must also be Alerted during the auction.) All other meanings are not Alertable.

2C: Not Alertable if strong and forcing, whether natural or artificial. All other meanings are Alertable (e.g. natural and weak or invitational).

2D, 2H, 2S: Weak, natural, non-conventional uses do not require an Alert. All other natural or conventional meanings are Alertable.

RESPONSES TO SUIT BIDS

1C - P - 1D: Not Alertable if natural, forcing one round and does not deny* a four- (or five) card major. All other uses must be Alerted. * Note: If 1D always denies a four-card major, the bid must be Alerted.

1C - P - 1H or 1C - P - 1S: Not Alertable if it shows four or more cards in the suit bid and is forcing for one round. Note that the fact that you might bypass a longer diamond suit is NOT Alertable.

1C - P - 1NT or 1D - P - 1NT: Not Alertable if it shows a limited (maximum of 11 HCP), balanced hand.

1D - P - 1H or 1D - P - 1S: Not Alertable if it is natural (four or more cards in the suit) and forcing for one round.

1H - P - 1S: Not Alertable if it is natural and forcing one round. Alertable if it is conventional.

1H – P – 1NT: Not Alertable if natural and non-forcing. **Announceable** if it is forcing or semi-forcing. Alert if it: 1) promises spades or 2) has some other conventional meaning.

(Note: Semi-forcing in this case means that opener may pass with a minimum and 5-3-3-1 distribution but otherwise will treat it as a forcing notrump. Passed-hand 1NT responses, unless they cannot be passed, do not require an Announcement.

1S – P – 1NT: Not Alertable if natural and non-forcing. Announceable if it is forcing or semi-forcing. Other conventional agreements require an Alert.

2C – P – 2D OR a 2NT response to a natural, strong two bid: Not Alertable if negative or temporizing (waiting).

2D, 2H, 2S – P – 2NT: Not Alertable if it asks for clarification. However, responses to 2NT by opener are Alertable. Natural, non-forcing 2NT responses to opening two bids must be alerted.

Note: a non-forcing suit response to a weak two-bid requires an Alert. A simple raise (2H – P – 3H, for example) of a weak two-bid that is invitational or better requires an Alert.

Game-forcing natural jump shifts are not Alertable. Other jump shifts (either conventional or natural and weak or intermediate) not in competition must be Alerted. A natural jump shift in competition does not require an Alert regardless of strength.

A natural 2NT response to one of a suit, which is invitational or better, does not require an Alert.

Two-over-one bids are not Alertable if they are natural and forcing for at least one round. **Note that natural two-over-one game-forcing bids are not Alertable.**

In general, responses by a passed hand are considered non-forcing and do not require an Alert.

OPENER'S REBIDS

A 1NT rebid if strong (may have 16 or more HCP) requires an alert.

A rebid in a suit that tends to be longer than the opening bid suit (canapé) requires an Alert.

Opener's rebid of two of a minor over partner's forcing or semi-forcing notrump response to a major does not require an Alert if it shows three or more cards of the suit bid (4-5-2-2 does not require an Alert as long as responder expects three or more cards in the minor).
